America's Cup 45 Regatta in Bermuda

... and it started with a call from Bermuda

Suzie: "Hi Dad, Remembrance Day is mid-week - so why don't come a couple

of weeks early when the AC 45 Regatta."

Herb: "Suzie, I thought the America Cup was to be in Bermuda in 2017 and its match racing."

Suzie: "Yes Dad, but already five contenders and the defender are having fleet races here to establish starting position for the Louie Vuitton Series. There has been a regatta in Gothenburg, Sweeden and one in England and now we're having a host regatta, a Saturday/Sunday series here in the sound in Bermuda."

Herb: "Sounds exciting, count me in."

On Friday afternoon we drove into downtown Hamilton to see what was happening. First view, a five story banner on a building for America Cup, lampposts decorated with the six country flags and banners with pictures of each skipper. Temporary



buildings of shipping containers for boat facilities were stacked up an official clothing outlet, a Dark & Stormy Bar, and

entertainment staging had been erected.. Front Street was closed to traffic and became a walk way with music, shops, and kiosks set up. The six AC 45 cats were swinging lazily on moorings along the water front and a large video display of past races was flashing. It was definitely going into early party mode.

Suzie had luckily gotten her boss's 22 ft cuddy runabout so we were on the water for the event. With races planned for Saturday afternoon, we packed lunch, swimsuits, sunglasses and drinks and we were off to the races. It was a great day. Sunny

and hot with small white clouds and blue sky but alas no wind. We waited with at least a thousand other boats anchored



along the course through postponement after postponement. As the afternoon slipped away they did do a little demo sail about the harbour but there wasn't enough wind to get up on foils. Fortunately the forecast for Sunday was twelve to fifteen knots of wind – the perfect wind and that proved true.



On Sunday we got a great anchorage on the left side of the course halfway up near the start line. Yes that's different. The side

midcourse start line allows the boats to turn to beam and immediately go up on foils. It's a fast start to midcourse, then round a buoy to starboard and head downwind to the windward gate. The date is two buoys they must go between but then may turn to round either one. Next they tack to windward to the windward gate. Again two buoys



where they can turn either way onto the downward leg. It's then to the leeward gate, back to the windward gate and a final run downwind to the finish. Total time... maybe twenty minutes.



Do they fly? Oh yes! Because the difference in speed in the water or up on foils is so great positions can change in a second. When up on foils, seven to ten feet out of the water, they are fast but unsteady. With spray flying they speed by. To capture

all the action, a helicopter was shipped to the island to get the ariel footage needed.

were three
races. We
could see
the start,
some of
the action
at the



windward gate and the boats flying down on their tacks downwind. There is not much structure to the open catamaran hulls but those three story foils are impressive and the action of the boats getting on and off plane is "nail biting" excitement.

The next race I heard is in Chicago in the spring, and then I assume a homeland venue for Japan, New Zealand, and France all in preparation for the America Cup match racing in Bermuda in 2017.
